B programme with the aim to inspire, promote and inculcate drafting & writing techniques, orating skills, and high focus research acumen in 1<sup>st</sup> year law students.

The competition strives to give a platform to the budding lawyers of our country to imbibe analytical skills in real-time situations. The aim is to engage with students and allow them to have first-hand experience of the complexities of the law.



# MOOT PROPOSITION

## Cloud9

Cloud9, one of the world's most beautiful and picturesque islands, became independent on 15th August 1997. The country had witnessed a violent struggle for independence for over a century, from different powers that had colonized different parts of the island. Cloud9 had a population of 1.1 billion people, majority of whom belonged to a religious sect called Undus. Undus were staunch believers of the occult, worshipped natural forces and had a strict policy against forcible/induced conversion.

Cloud9 was largely influenced by the ideals of the Constitution of India, and therefore enacted the Constitution of Cloud9, 2000 which was mutatis mutandis with the Constitution of India. Parliament of Cloud9 also enacted the Cloud9 Criminal Major (Application of Indian Laws) Act, 2001 by virtue of which it adopted the Indian Penal Code, 1860, the Criminal Procedure Code, 1973, the Indian Evidence Act, 1872 were made applicable to Cloud9 mutatis mutandis.

## History of Cloud9

The term 'secularism' was included as part of the Preamble of the Constitution of Cloud9 in the 2000s, signifying the unwillingness of the Central Government to have a State-religion. Upon this, several states soon passed laws prohibiting religious conversions, to curtail religious conversions. Currently there are eight states which have such statutes in effect. Efforts were also made to enact anti-conversion laws at the national level, but it could not garner sufficient support in the Parliament of Cloud9.

## Cloud9 Vidhi Virudh Dharma Samparivartan Pratishedh Adhyadhesh, 2022

### Promulgation

However in 2022, the President of Cloud9, Glenn Sturgis promulgated the Cloud9 Vidhi Virudh Dharma Samparivartan Pratishedh Adhyadhesh, 2022 under Article 123 of the Constitution of Cloud9, making unlawful religious conversion a non-bailable and cognizable offence.

### Preamble

*"To provide for prohibition of unlawful conversion from one religion to another by misrepresentation, force, undue influence, coercion, allurements or by any fraudulent means or by marriage and for the matters connected therewith or incidental thereto."*

### Legislative Scheme

Section DD of the Ordinance prohibits one person from converting the religion of another person by marriage. In another words, religious conversion by marriage is made unlawful. Violation of this provision is punishable with imprisonment for a term which is not less than one year but which may extend up to 5 years and a fine of minimum rupees fifteen thousand.

If the person converted happens to be a woman, the punishment is double the normal term and fine. The offence has been made cognizable and non-bailable. Section PP enables any person related to the converted person by blood or marriage to lodge an FIR against the conversion. Section YY empowers Courts to void any marriage if it is done for the sole purpose of unlawful conversion or if unlawful conversion is done for the sole purpose of marriage. **Reverse Onus** Ordinarily, in criminal cases the burden to establish the guilt of an Accused rests on the state. This dovetails with the essential principle of every Accused having a presumption of innocence in her favour. Over time, though, many statutory inroads have been made into this principle. Beginning with requiring an Accused to establish certain facts (evidential burdens), today there are several instances of Accused persons requiring to establish innocence itself. A reverse onus of proof provision was included in the Cloud9 Vidhi Virudh Dharma Samparivartan Pratishedh Adhyadhesh, 2022.

### Section GG reads:

*The burden of proof as to whether a religious conversion was not effected through misrepresentation, force, undue influence, coercion, allurement, or by any fraudulent means or by marriage, lies on the person who has caused the conversion and, where such conversion has been facilitated by any person, on such person.*

Cloud9's Evidence Act, 1987 statutorily legitimizes for the establishment of an evidentiary reversal of the burden of proof in situations where the evidence is solely within the knowledge of the accused. Scholars have noted that though these reverse onus clauses provide for swifter legal proceedings in the majority of circumstances, it also comes with the risk of being hasty and injudicious. The vociferous opposition initially faced by these clauses across the common-law world has certainly shifted to a resigned acceptance in light of the perceived needs of law enforcement. However, we are now in a time when legislatures resort to such egregious provisions at the drop of a hat, exhibiting a numbness to the severe curtailment of liberties they entail.

### Password and Testimonial Compulsion

The almost simultaneous impetus to these laws in various states did not augur well for the religious minorities, who were already suffering the onslaught of right-wing ascendancy in the political sphere. To raise their voice against the visible unfair treatment to the religious minorities, several thousands of people came on road who maintained that the Ordinance though appears to be facially neutral but could not just be seen in isolation with the social and political context of the Cloud9. The protestors raised concerns around the scheme of the Cloud9 Vidhi Virudh Dharma Samparivartan Pratishedh Adhyadhesh, 2022, for instance, it requires every religious conversion to be scrutinized and certified by the State and it criminalises the act of religious conversion, punishing the converted and the converter alike if not found within the legislative parameters.



During the protest, Shumaan was a person caught in the crosshairs of law enforcement agencies, and his mobile phone was allegedly important to advance the investigation into offences. In September 2022, the police went before the trial court asking for court orders to direct the Shumaan to unlock his mobile phone and grant access to email accounts, as the Shumaan had refused to cooperate. The court duly passed this direction and it appears the Shumaan complied. Then, the police moved another application before the trial court, this time asking for directions that the Shumaan be subjected to a polygraph test to confirm the mobile / email passwords, as it appeared that the Shumaan had been lying about the same during investigation. The court allowed this application as well and directed the polygraph tests be conducted — orders which, according to the Shumaan, were passed without ever giving him an opportunity to be heard and without considering if he had indeed consented to undergoing such tests. The High Court in appeal inter alia opined that providing passcodes or biometrics wouldn't amount to testimonial compulsion, contrasting giving of a password with giving of bodily samples.

### **The Matter**

Aggrieved with the decision of the High Court, Shumaan moved the Supreme Court under Article 32 asserting that any direction to reveal a password to unlock a smartphone would amount to a testimonial compulsion and therefore, barred by Article 20(3). He further claimed that “despite the protection given to informational privacy by the Puttaswamy case, the High Court held that a direction to reveal the password wouldn't affect the right to privacy.

Regardless, the approach adopted by the High Court of Parel restricted the constitutional protection afforded to the citizens instead of enhancing it. With the increase in the use of password-protected devices, this is only the first of the many such cases to come.”

On the other hand, the Criminal Justice and Police Accountability, a criminal law awareness group run by the students of Cloud9 Marwadi University filed a Public Interest Litigation before the Supreme Court challenging the

constitutionality of Section GG of the Cloud9 Vidhi Virudh Dharma Samparivartan Pratishedh Adhyadhesh, 2022.

Considering the gravity of the issues pending adjudication, a Constitution Bench of Supreme Court of Cloud9 comprising of Justices Jake Harper, Charlie Harper, Alan Harper, Greg Melnik and Eldritch McElroy agreed to admit, club, and decide the issue, in the manner contained in the following paragraph.

*Participants to prepare litigation strategies and legal submissions for the relevant stakeholders in the matter on the following issues:*

**a. Argue on the constitutionality of the reverse onus clause crafted in Section GG of the Cloud9 Vidhi Virudh Dharma Samparivartan Pratishedh Adhyadhesh, 2022;**

**b. Argue on the validity of directions passed to reveal passwords of personal electronic possessions in light of Article 20(3).**

**DISCLAIMER:** The Moot Court Problem is not intended to and does not attempt to resemble any incident, organisation or any person living or dead. All situations in the Moot Court Problem are fictitious and any resemblance to any incident, organisation or person, if any, is not intended, but merely coincidental.

**NOTE:** The Moot Proposition has been drafted by Mr Shreyans Jain, Associate, Shardul Amarchand Mangaldas. Any attempt made to contact the above person for the purpose of moot proposition on or before the competition shall result in immediate disqualification from the competition.

# RULE BOOK

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Organising Committee of the 2nd National Moot Court Competition will have exclusive authority to interpret the rules in the interest of just and fair competition. The definitions placed below by the Organising Committee shall be final and the decision of the Organising Committee regarding the applicability of these rules will be final. These rules may be called the rules for the 2nd National Moot Court Competition, 2022.

## DEFINITIONS

- **‘Bench’** refers to the members duly invited by the institute, to adjudge any of the rounds, collectively.
- **‘Clarifications’** means any questions, queries, or doubts sent by the registered teams to the organisers, within the given deadline.
- **‘Competition’** means the 2nd Marwadi University National Moot Court Competition, 2022.
- **‘Speaker’** refers to a participant who presents oral arguments in any given round.
- **‘Penalty’** refers to the deductions imposed on the memorandum scores of a participating institution.
- **‘Participating Team’** means the team which has registered itself for the competition as per the rules for registration.
- **‘Participating Institution’** shall be presumed to be the institution of the participating teams.
- **‘Moot Problem’** means a set of facts published by the institution for moot court competition.
- **‘Rebuttals’** refer to those arguments /questions that the Complainant may raise at the end of the main pleadings of all the Orators.
- **‘Sur-rebuttal’** refers to the defense presented by the Respondent to the rebuttals.
- **‘Organiser’** means Marwadi University, Faculty of Law, NMCC, FoL, MU
- **‘Organising Committee’** means the Moot Court Committee (MCC), FoL, MU
- **‘Court Room’** shall refer to the courtrooms where the oral rounds will take place.
- **‘Scouting’** means a person observing the Oral Rounds of a team other than the team such person is associated with.
- **‘Team Code’** refers to the code allocated to a participating institution by the organizing committee after completion of the Registration.

## LANGUAGE

The official language of the competition shall be **British English** only.

## ELIGIBILITY

- 1st-year law students enrolled in 3 years LL. B programme and 5 years integrated programme from any college / institution / university recognized by BCI across the country.
- Only one team shall be allowed from one College / Institution / University.
- No faculty members, coach, or a designated, observer will be allowed to join the team during the competition.

## TEAM COMPOSITION

- The team shall comprise of either two members (being designated as Speakers and one of the speakers shall be designated as Researcher) OR three members (two of them shall be designated as Speakers and one of them shall be designated as Researcher).
- No team will be allowed to substitute any of its members after a team has submitted its Registration form, except with the permission of the organisers.

## DRESS CODE

The participating teams must adhere to the following dress code during the moot court competition

- **Male**- White shirt, black trousers, black tie, black coat, and black shoes.
- **Female**- White salwar and kurta or white shirt and black trousers along with a black coat and black shoes.

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

- Online registrations are open from 12 March, 2022. The teams must register online by 10 April, 2022.
- The registration shall be done by filling up the registration form available at our official website.
- The registration shall be considered complete only when the 'Registration Fee' has been paid successfully and the registration form is duly filled with all the credentials.
- The participants will receive an official approval mail from organising committee carrying the 'Team Code' latest by 12 April, 2022 or earlier. The teams shall quote this team code in all further communications with the organising committee.
- The registration fee for the competition is 5000.00 INR. Registration fee once paid is non-refundable.

## CORRECTION AND CLARIFICATION

The teams may request for correction and clarification regarding the moot proposition as per the date given in the important dates, i.e. 12 April, 2022. Such requests shall be sent at [folnmcc@marwadieducation.edu.in](mailto:folnmcc@marwadieducation.edu.in) only. No other mode of communication will be taken into consideration.

## MEMORIAL SUBMISSION

- All memorials submitted for all purposes of the Competition shall firmly comply with the rules of the competition. Each participating team must prepare two written submissions, one for each Petitioner/Applicant(s) as well as Respondent(s) side.
- Petitioner/Applicant(s) memorials are required to have a Blue cover and Respondent(s) memorials are required to have Red cover.
- Soft copies of memorials shall be submitted in both .pdf and .doc/.docx format latest by 20 April, 2022 on the official website. Late submissions shall be penalised (1 mark per day) and no memorial shall be accepted after two days from the specified date.
- Six hard copies of the memorial from each side should be sent to the Organisers at the address provided on the front page by 25 April, 2022.
- The memorial shall be uploaded on the official portal created during the registration. The organising committee will not be responsible for any delay and default.



## MEMORIAL CONTENT

- The memorial must contain the following pages only:
  - Cover Page – The cover page shall contain the Case Title, Side of the Memorial, Year of the Competition, Name of the Court, and Team Code on the top right corner.
  - Table of Contents
  - Index of Authorities
  - Statement of Jurisdiction
  - Statement of Facts
  - Issues Raised
  - Summary of Arguments
  - Pleadings / Arguments Advanced (20 Pages max)
  - Prayer

## GUIDELINES FOR MEMORIAL FORMATTING

The following content specifications must be strictly followed: -

- The memorial shall be typed on an A4 size page and all the pages of the memorial should have a page number at the bottom.
- Font and Size (General) – Times New Roman, 12 pts.
- Line Spacing (General) – 1.5 lines.
- Font and Size (Footnotes) – Times New Roman, 10 pts.
- Line Spacing (Footnotes) – Single lines.
- Page Margins – 1 inch on all sides.
- All the citations and footnotes must be in compliance with the 20<sup>th</sup> Edition of the Bluebook

## PLAGIARISM POLICY

Plagiarism in any manner is strictly prohibited and if any participating team found to be indulging in same shall be disqualified from the competition. The decision of the organising committee regarding plagiarism would be final and binding on all participants.

## ANATOMY OF TEAMS

- Teams shall not reveal their identity in any form, except by means of the Team Code allotted to them during the Competition.
- The Written Submissions shall not reveal the identity of the team in any form and should not bear the logo, name, etc. of the University represented.
- Any violation of the above rules shall attract severe penalty or disqualification as determined by the organising committee. The decision of the organising committee in this regard shall be final and binding on the participating team.

## ORAL ROUNDS OF THE COMPETITION

### General

The competition shall consist of Preliminary Rounds, Quarter-Final Rounds, Semi-Final Rounds, and the Final Round.

### Preliminary Rounds:

- The rounds shall be conducted physically at the specified venue.
- Each team shall argue once from the side allotted to them through the Draw of Lots, which shall be notified to the teams one day prior to the round.
- Each team shall strictly get a total time of 30 minutes to present their case. This time will include rebuttal and sur-rebuttal time [if permitted by the judge(s)]. The time distribution per speaker is left at the discretion of the teams subject to a minimum of 10 minutes per speaker and no more than 15 minutes per speaker. Rebuttals can be allocated a time of a maximum of 5 minutes.
- At the beginning of the preliminary rounds, the teams shall specify the time distribution for their rebuttals of each speaker to the moderator. The rebuttal round proceeding shall be initiated once the moderator informs the team about the commencement of the time limit.
- Strict adherence to court manners shall be observed by all the participants.

### Quarter-Final Rounds:

- The top 8 teams with the highest score in the Preliminary Rounds shall proceed to the Quarter-Finals. The match-up of teams in Quarter-Final Rounds shall be determined on the basis of draw of lots.
- In case of a tie in scores calculated, the team with the higher score in the Written Submission (Memorials) shall proceed to this round.
- Each team shall strictly get a total time of 30 minutes to argue, which will include rebuttal and sur-rebuttal time [if permitted by the judge(s)]. Extension of time may be permissible at the discretion of judges.
- At the beginning of the Quarter-Final Rounds the teams shall specify the time distribution for each speaker and rebuttal to the moderator. The rebuttal round proceeding shall be initiated once the moderator informs the team about the commencement of the time limit.
- Strict adherence to court manners shall be observed by all the participants.

## **Semi – Final Rounds:**

- The Top 4 teams of the Quarter-Final Rounds shall be qualified for the Semi-Final Rounds. The match-up of teams in Semi-Final Rounds shall be decided on the basis of the draw of lots.
- Each team shall get a total time of 45 minutes to argue, which will include rebuttal and sur-rebuttal time [if permitted by the judge(s)]. The division of time per speaker is left to the discretion of the teams.
- A time-extension for a maximum of 2 minutes may be granted to each team at the discretion of the Judge.
- Strict adherence to court manners shall be observed by all the participants.

## **Final Round:**

- The top two teams from the Semi-Final Rounds shall qualify for the final round.
- Each team shall get a total time of 60 minutes to which will include rebuttal and sur-rebuttal time [if permitted by the judge(s)]. The division of time per speaker is left to the discretion of the teams.
- A time-extension for a maximum of 5 minutes may be granted to each team at the discretion of the Judge.
- Strict adherence to court manners shall be observed by all the participants.

## GENERAL CODE OF CONDUCT

- Teams entering / indulging in any kind of misconduct, or violating the afore-mentioned rules and regulations will lead them to disqualification.
- The decision of the judges with regards to the oral rounds shall be final

## SCOUTING

- Scouting is strictly prohibited. Scouting by any team shall entail instant disqualification.

## MISCELLANEOUS RULES

- The Organising Committee reserves the right to amend, modify, change or repeal any of the competition rules at any stage. The Organising Committee shall convey any changes made in the competition rules to the Participating Teams.
- If a team is of the perspective that violation of the rules of the competition has taken place at any stage of the competition, the team (s) shall inform within half an hour after the completion of the round to Organising Committee.
- Team(s) under no circumstances shall approach the Judges with any complaints.

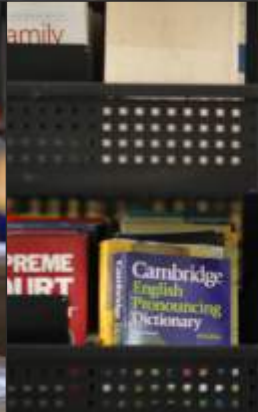
